## Speech by Ambassador of Japan HE Mr Hiroyasu Kobayashi for the 77th Anniversary of the Featherston Incident

Your Worship Alex Beijen, Mayor of the South Wairarapa District, Distinguished guests, Ladies and gentlemen:

I sincerely appreciate this opportunity to attend the commemoration of the 77<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Featherston Incident today. While it is now my second attendance to this memorial, it is my first with the new Mayor of South Wairarapa District, Mayor Beijen. It is a pleasure to be here with you today to see how far both Japan and New Zealand have come in the past 77 years to build a positive and mutually beneficial relationship. I would like to express my deep gratitude for the efforts of Japanese and New Zealanders of the past and present, who have worked towards the strong relationship our countries now share.

We are commemorating a time in which our ancestors struggled to understand one another. However now, it is a great honour to be here today in this Memorial Garden uniting Japanese and New Zealand people. This beautiful place symbolises the reconciliation, mutual understanding and positive relationship between Japan and New Zealand. I am sure this relationship will continue to flourish and the garden will continue to represent our two countries' strong connection.
