It is a great pleasure for me to be with you all today for the Commencement Ceremony of IPU New Zealand. I have visited this campus once before, although this will be my first time giving a speech, and I am very grateful for the invitation. Please allow me to add my voice in congratulating you for the Commencement Ceremony

I believe that IPU is a good choice of educational institution, as it offers excellent faculty and staff, and a beautiful campus, which is the perfect environment for learning. I also believe that New Zealand itself is a good choice of country in which to study. Please allow me to elaborate a little on why I think this: I believe that both IPU and New Zealand value similar principles. With the remaining part of your time, you should broaden your horizons with travel. Explore a new country or learn about a new culture; the international students especially are in the perfect position to do this. At the same time, I encourage you to make as many friends as possible while you are here. They are essential to your quality of life, and will be valuable assets for your future career. As human beings, the ability to continue to grow and learn is our unique trait. It is therefore something we should cherish and continue to do throughout our lives.
